### Counting Butterflies at St Olave's.

The Big Butterfly Count takes place each year for just over a fortnight at the end of July and into early August. This year I carried out a single 15-minute count in both the new and old churchyard, on a hot afternoon on


29th July. It was probably too warm for the best numbers.

There were: 10 Meadow Browns, 8 Green-Veined Whites, 6 Gatekeepers. 2 Speckled Woods and 2 Small White. Gatekeepers and Meadow Browns are normally the commonest species recorded nationally, and that is likely to be repeated this year. The number of Green-Veined Whites is larger than you might expect. They like damper conditions and so the proximity to the lake is probably an important factor. Speckled Woods like shadier areas in the churchyard.

The numbers of individual butterflies were twice as many as Newport Cemetery, and three times as many as in Carisbrooke St Mary's churchyard but not as good as Ryde Cemetery's conservation area. The edges of St Olave's churchyards are particularly rich in plants and flowers, although it was the bramble that attracted more species than the willowherb.

Elsewhere in the parish by far the best numbers were often the lanes with lots of marjoram in the verges. It will be interesting to repeat the count annually at St Olave's and see how things fluctuate over the years. This result and others in the parish carried out by a range of volunteers can be seen by looking at the maps available on the Big Butterfly Count website.
