Your Church Matters!!

On the agenda from our March meeting was the question of the Amalgamation of St Olave's with Newport and Carisbrooke Church Council. Currently we are 'in plurality with' but three years ago, it was suggested that we might amalgamate.

Revd Steve explained the differences. Amalgamation would mean that all decisions regarding St Olave's would be made by the new Combined PCC. St Olave's would become a DCC (District Church Council) with a 'seat at that table' but with reduced responsibilities. Gatcombe have decided not to pursue their application to be a part of the Newport and Carisbrooke Church Council. But rather remain as a separate parish within the Benefice.



We are waiting for the report from the recent Space for Nature walks to be available. It's anticipated that we can then have further discussions about future management to further enhance the beauty of the churchyard, - as shown in the lovely photos on the next page - and, in conjunction with some sympathetic re-wilding, to further encourage the natural flora and fauna. The forthcoming Biosphere Festival (June 27 - July 5) and input from Richard Smout and Gillian Belben will also be of great help.

Donna and Carol have passed their Level 2 Hygiene Course and their certificates are in the vestry. The recent Jazz Evening was a great success and had the added bonus of boosting church funds. The PCC has received a letter of thanks from Bishop Jonathan for meeting our Parish Share in 2025. Supporting the local and global communities are of vital importance though too, and following the success of our first Lend with Care project in December 2024, we have now re-invested the £250 in another worthy project.....

The Al-Anwar Group is made up of five male smallholder farmers from the Kasur district, aged between 21 and 43. Across their households, they support 18 children. Eight of these children are currently enrolled in education, while the others are seeking employment opportunities. All members of the group are married.

Muhammad Iqbal, 43 years old and married, is among the group's farmers. His family of four comprises himself, his wife, and two sons. One of them is in school and the other is still an infant. Muhammad Iqbal cultivates around five acres of agricultural land, alternating between wheat production in winter and rice cultivation in summer. His estimated annual farming profit stands at roughly £1,020. Obtaining tractor access, when necessary, represents one of his primary challenges.

Through Akhuwat Islamic Microfinance, Lendwithcare's local partner organisation in Pakistan, farmers gain access to interest-free loans alongside agricultural extension programs and community development initiatives designed to improve crop yields. Muhammad Iqbal's group has applied for a loan to buy a tractor.

Having their own tractor would enable the group to carry out farming activities without being subject to rental machinery availability, decrease their rental spending, and enhance the efficiency of transporting produce to market. This investment is anticipated to raise both productivity levels and the group's collective income.

Bishop Jonathan was delighted to announce the appointment of the Ven Barry Dugmore as the new Archdeacon of the Isle of Wight. Barry, who is currently Archdeacon Missioner in the Diocese of Coventry, used to work in a role that took him across the island and led worship in Locks Heath. He was ordained here, and then served as a priest in Cowplain and Whiteley. So he genuinely feels as though he is coming 'home'. He will become the most senior Anglican cleric on the island, supporting our parishes in ministry and mission. He will be licensed at Portsmouth Cathedral on May 31st.

His appointment will ease the workload on our parish's clergy, Chris, Steve, Emma and Abbie as Revd Chris has been Acting Archdeacon since the resignation last year of the Ven Steve Daughtery and unlike the former Archdeacon, the new Archdeacon will have no parish on the island.

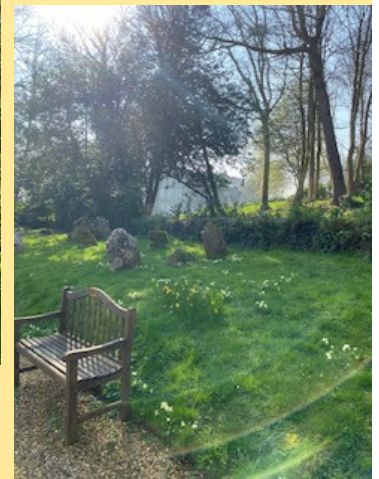

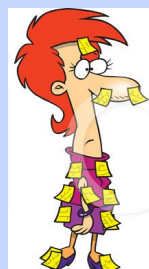
